

Redeemer Prayer Team: A Ministry of Intercession

“Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God’s will for you in Christ Jesus.”
– 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

The prayer team intercedes for – prays on behalf of – our church, its leaders, and its ministries.

Members:

- **Pray consistent, intentional, Kingdom-centered prayers for Redeemer and the City.** Members will receive emails every other week (sometimes more often) about how they can pray for our church and its staff. We commit to keeping all prayer requests *confidential*, not forwarding emails and refraining from conversation about them, even if they’re not ‘confidential’ per se.
- **Participate in Sunday morning prayer** (10:50–11:20am in room 406). We’ll meditate on the sermon scripture and then pray in response, interceding for the church services and seeking personal renewal. Anyone can come – we hope that prayer team members will attend as often as possible, as well as invite friends and community group members. It’s a great opportunity to pray and serve our church together.
- **Gather 1-3 time a year** for fellowship and prayer.
- Additional and/or special prayer sessions are scheduled when urgently needed.

Optional:

- **Attend West Side Summit meetings.** These times are to equip the lay church leadership.
- **Fast when we want to approach God for special prayer requests.** Some do partial fasting; others a 24-hour fast. Some fast from food; others from other things. Others may fast near the time of special prayer because they are unable to do so on the actual day we will be praying.

The commitment runs for one ministry calendar year (September to August). Members can renew each year as the Lord leads. Some might go off for a particularly busy season in their lives, and return at a later time.

Prerequisites: We ask that prior to joining the Prayer Team you are a **member of Redeemer**. Our intent is not to be legalistic about church membership. Because at times we are entrusted with confidential or sensitive prayer requests, we think of church membership as a way of saying, in effect, that the relationship with the church and its leadership and people is a committed one. We also ask that you are an **active member of a Community Group**, since that is the primary place where you are known and cared for at Redeemer.

Identifying Those With a Ministry of Prayer

We are looking for people who may be hidden, who enjoy behind-the-scenes ministry, who want to partner with those on the front line but don't know how to – or no one has ever asked. We want to equip and encourage them. We don't need to orchestrate how they are to pray – the Spirit will do that – we will just let them know whom to pray for and the vision God has given Redeemer. We will share prayer requests about staff, ministries, and special needs so we can intercede intentionally and regularly for those on the firing line.

Earmarks of one called to a ministry of intercession (some, not all, is typical):

- Love to pray... praying for extended periods of time is a joy and delight!
- Content to be in ministry behind-the-scenes – or, if also involved in front-line ministry, make prayer a priority in that ministry engagement
- Desire to grow in praying and to learn more about prayer
- Expect God to hear their prayer and to answer according to His wisdom
- See answers to prayer regularly
- Receive regular insight and scripture that informs their praying
- Keep tenaciously a personal confidence of another
- Place pastors and/or ministries as a high priority in their total prayer life
- Sought after by others for prayer
- Enjoy intimacy with the Lord in their daily walk with Him
- Has often a compassion/mercy gifting
- Feel comfortable praying alone, with others, in different environments, at various times of the day

What is Kingdom-Centered Prayer?

We often think about prayer as a means to get our personal needs met. However, prayer is really a means to praise and adore God, to know Him, to come into His presence, and be transformed by Him. We need to better learn how to pray, repent, and petition God as a people.

“Kingdom-centered prayer is not mere instinct but it is Spirit enabled; not man-centered but God-centered; not self-serving but Kingdom-serving; not sentimental but Scriptural; not solo but concerted; not timid but bold; not passive resignation but proactive cooperation. Kingdom-centered prayer is the Spirit-enabled reverent cry of God’s adopted sons and daughters, seeking their Father’s glory by persistently asking Him for the nations, their promised inheritance.” – Archie Parrish

Biblically and historically, the one non-negotiable, universal ingredient in times of spiritual renewal is corporate, prevailing, intensive, and kingdom-centered prayer. What is that?

1. It is focused on God's presence and kingdom. Jack Miller talks about the difference between "maintenance prayer" and "frontline" prayer meetings. Maintenance prayer meetings are short, mechanical, and totally focused on physical needs inside the church. But frontline prayer has three basic traits: 1) a request for grace to confess sins and humble ourselves; 2) a compassion and zeal for the flourishing of the church and reaching the lost; and 3) a yearning to know God, to see His face, to see His glory. Now these are not trite statements. It is quite clear when listening to a prayer meeting whether these traits are present. Most interesting is to study Biblical prayer for revival such as in Acts 4 or Exodus 33 or Nehemiah 1. In these passages, the three elements are easy to see. Notice, for example, in Acts 4, that the disciples, whose lives had been threatened, did not ask for protection for themselves and their families, but only boldness to keep preaching!

2. It is bold and specific. Dr. Martin Lloyd-Jones notes that the greatest men were quite bold in prayer, highly specific, and filled their mouths with arguments. In commenting on Moses' prayer for glory in Exodus 33, he writes: "I commend to you the reading of biographies of men who have been used by God in the church throughout the centuries, especially in revival. And you will find this same holy boldness, this argumentation, this reasoning, this putting the case to God, pleading His own promises. Oh, that is the whole secret of prayer, I sometimes think. Thomas Goodwin uses a wonderful term. He says, 'Sue Him for it, sue Him for it.' Do not leave Him alone. Pester Him, as it were, with His own promise. Quote the Scripture to Him. And, you know, God delights to hear us doing it, as a Father likes to see this element in His own child who has obviously been listening to what his Father has been saying."

3. It is prevailing, corporate. By this we mean simply that prayer should be constant, not sporadic and brief. Why? Are we to think that God wants to see us grovel? Why do we not simply put our request in and wait? The answer is that we had not been so impertinent. Sporadic, brief prayer is so because we do not make time for it. It shows a lack of dependence, a self-sufficiency, and thus we have not built an altar that God can honor with his fire. We must pray without ceasing, pray long, pray hard, and we will find that the very process is bringing about that which we are asking for—to have our hard hearts melted, to tear down barriers, to have the glory of God break through.

4. It calls to corporate repentance and longing for God. In addition, kingdom-centered prayer is characterized by repentance over our lack of love, joy, zeal for the lost, hunger for God, and so on. Any church has corporate sins. This must be done wisely! It must be accompanied by (and based on) enormous *hope*. We have hope in the gospel that God can do mighty things in our midst. Corporate repentance should usually be done in conjunction with setting concrete plans for change and outreach. Prayer meetings should also combine repentance with keeping accounts of answered prayer, new conversions and other victories. See 2 Corinthians 7 for the dangers of falling into depressing remorse and regret, rather than repentance that brings zeal.
