INTRODUCTION

- Counterfeit: Elation that rests in blessings instead of the Blesser. A wavering, fleeting happiness based on circumstances.

Discovering more joy does not save us from the inevitability of hardship and heartbreak. In fact, we may cry more easily, but we will laugh more easily too. Perhaps we are just more alive. Yet as we discover more joy, we can face suffering in a way that ennobles rather than embitters. We have hardship without becoming hard. We have heartbreaks without being broken. –Desmond Tutu

If you're a Christian, you know that Christianity is supposed to be about joy....I often wrestle with that concept. I have to ask myself, "Why do things affect me so much? Why is my joy not relentless?" Sometimes I wonder, "Do we have that kind of impervious joy?" I'm afraid not. I don't think we understand the nature of this joy. In Romans 8:28-30 Paul tells us that if we follow Christ, our bad things turn out for our good, our good things cannot be lost, and our best things are yet to come. Those are the reasons for our joy. —Timothy Keller
