This is the second of seven short articles on the core elements of Redeemer's basic vision.

Since Redeemer's beginning one of the most formative influences on our identity has been our particular attitude toward the city.

JOY IN THE CITY

"...as the city goes, so goes a society."

irst, we teach the importance of the city. It is where the seminal ideas, values, and spirit of our nation's culture is forged and from which they then spread. It is a microcosm of the world, where most of the world's races, classes, and cultures live in close proximity. So, as the city goes, so goes a society. Paul's mission to the Roman world focused on major cities and ignored the countryside. In a recent book, James Boice says that instead of just mourning loudly over social decay, tens of thousands of Christians should move back into major cities. "Not every Christian needs to live in our cities, but far more should live in them than do now. They should live in them as their mission field of choice." (Two Cities; Two Loves, p.166)

Second, we teach love for the city. Put negatively, we urge our people to avoid three improper attitudes. We should not despise the city for its great sin and brokenness, as if the sin we see there is not from our own hearts. Nor should we glorify and emulate the city uncritically for its human excellence, forgetting that we make idols out of our gifts. Nor should we simply use the city for its opportunities for advancement, but remain blind to its opportunities for service. Rather we should love the city, "blessing" the city (*Prov.11:11*), i.e. rejoicing in its assets and working on its troubles.

Third, we seek the peace of the city. We serve the city by connecting people to God through Christ. But the goal of city ministry is more than the accumulation of individual conversions. Philip's urban ministry resulted in "great joy in that city." God tells his people in a pagan city, Babylon, to "Build houses and settle down...seek the peace of the city...Pray to the Lord for it, for it prospers, you prosper." (*Jeremiah 29:5-7*) We must live so as to bring the city *shalom*—total well-being, spiritu-

ally, socially, materially. We want to have an impact on the whole way the city lives. We want joy in the city.

Fourth, we teach respect for the city. Christians who are saved by grace should lose any sense of superiority or savior-complex. We need the city to challenge our cultural assumptions wrongly elevated to the same status as Biblical truth and to supplement our gifts through the insights and gifts from other types of people. We need to learn as much about faith and grace from those we serve as they from us.

Proverbs 11:10 - "When the righteous prosper, the city rejoices... Through the blessing of the upright a city is exalted." What kind of church would Redeemer have to be for the whole city to rejoice that we are here? That guiding question is one of the core values which drives Redeemer's entire ministry vision.

STEWARDSHIP: TRUSTING GOD

Keep your lives free from the love of money and be content with what you have, because God has said, "Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you." So we say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can man do to me?" (Hebrews 13:5-6)

s the author of Hebrews reminds us, trusting God with our finances is part of the larger issue of trusting God with our whole lives. If we truly believe that our Heavenly Father is with us, watching over us with intense per-

sonal concern, then we can rightly relax from an over-absorption with our money.

Anything less shows that we fear the consequences of placing our money in God's hands: "What if he fails me? What if he looks away and I'm ruined? What if I miss a great opportunity?" This kind of self-talk forgets the astonishing grace of the gospel. And once the gospel is forgotten, then fear and insecurity creep in.

Our standing before God, if we are in Christ, is a gift of unbelievable proportions. We are given what we cannot, could not, ever

earn—right standing before the Father—because Christ pays our penalty of sin and transfers to us his perfect righteousness (*2Cor 5:21*). Since we are adopted into the heavenly family by grace alone, we can trust that we are kept in God's family by grace alone.

The same God who loves us enough to sacrifice his Son on our behalf, loves us enough to shake us free from money's grip on our life. As the writer to the Hebrews asks, why hold onto a meager impostor when the true security stands pouring himself into your life? Why fear the temporary things of this world when the eternal, solid rock of the Lord is for you?

Therefore, our contentment with our current economic standing (good or bad), is a way that we can acknowledge that God's mark is on our life. Christians are able to treat money differently—it no longer has the power over us that it once had, it becomes merely the means to the end of glorifying God. As money stops becoming the measure of our worth, it also fades as the key factor in life decisions. This means that both rich and poor Christians hold their money loosely. Christians are shockingly generous. Why? It's their family resemblance to the generosity of God.

As we talk later this month about ways for you to invest your money in God's kingdom here in the city, won't you consider what God is calling you to trust him with? Malachi 3:10: "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it."

DIVORCE MINISTRY BEGINS

indy Owens knows firsthand the feelings of hopelessness and devastation that a divorce can unleash. In fact, it's what eventually led her to begin Redeemer's new ministry to divorced and separated people. "I started a group for divorced people in Jacksonville (Florida) after my divorce," Cindy said. "It was a selfish reason—I knew I needed it. I never imagined it would be me doing a ministry to the divorced."

Cindy will lead a Manhattan home fellowship group that will be geared specifically to people who are struggling with the pain of past divorce or are going through divorce proceedings. Her group will follow Redeemer's vision of providing primary pastoral care and nurturing through weekly, small group meetings that include times of worship, prayer and Bible study.

Some of the early discussions will focus on how group members can deal with issues of anger, depression

and forgiveness. "In that group, people need to see that God is still in control of their situation," Cindy said. "They need to know other people are experiencing those same hurts, have survived and have seen the blessing of God."

Cindy moved to Manhattan six months ago to become general director of the American Lung Association of New York. After her divorce, she said, "I saw God at work in all of my situations. He was with me every step of the way. I never before had such a profound experience of the Lord's presence."

As a result, Cindy will encourage her group to look to the presence and power of Jesus Christ in their midst. "It's not a matter of going through it (a divorce) — anyone can do that — but, rather, growing through it. And you do that by relying on Jesus and His strength."
