The evening soloists will be Michelle Jennings, Kimberly Ju-Juan and George Merritt. There will also be testimonies of changed lives in celebration of Jesus's resurrection power poured into the lives of his people. (See related article.)

An Easter sacrificial offering will be taken (in addition to the regular offering) for meeting mercy needs. This is a meaningful part of Easter celebration for many people, so come prepared to give to the needs of others in proportion to the generosity with which God has given to us.

Maundy Thursday Service and Supper March 27

Redeemer's celebration of the Last Supper will be held at 7:00 p.m. at All Souls Church, at 80th and Lexington. Prior to the service, at 6:15 p.m. there will be a recital by the string quartet, which will perform Haydn's "*Seven Last Words of Christ.*" The service will also include communion and a reenactment of footwashing. Child care will be provided from 6:00 p.m. until the end of the service.

Following the service will be a soup and bread fellowship meal downstairs in the fellowship hall. Tickets for the supper cost \$7.00 and will go on sale March 9. If tickets remain, they will be sold at the door following the service.

Easter Offering for Hope for New York

E aster Sunday Redeemer will again take a special offering for the needy of New York City. Once a year the whole church is given the opportunity to participate in the Easter Sacrificial Offering, which is distributed to ministries of mercy which feed the homeless, tutor children, teach English to immigrants. etc., through our sister agency, Hope for New York.



In a city like New York, with a vast range of human needs, it is vi-

tal to the health of our church that we reach out to the less fortunate with deeds of mercy as well as words of eternal life. Once a year, we do that corporately through the Easter Sacrificial Offering. Contributions are made at this one offering to Hope for New York. If your company encourages your participation in the United Way fund, you may designate Hope for New York as the recipient by noting the code number: 019933. You may also double your gift through your company's Corporate Matching Gift program (speak to someone in the Human Resources department where you work for the company forms.)

To maximize the effectiveness of the financial contributions, we also send out volunteers who give of their time and talents to help our ministry partners utilize their funds most effectively. Look for volunteer opportunities in the weekly bulletin and in the twice annual Ministry Fair.

The Problem of Piousbabble

ost of us are familiar with the term "pyschobabble" to describe the often meaningless mix of psychological terms, talkshow wisdom, and self-help mantras which passes for conversation in some circles. Let me coin a term to describe a similar ill which is found only in Christian circles: piousbabble.

Piousbabble is a mixture of words and phrases which, used individually and with care, might be inoffensive, but swirled together and poured out in an unthinking stream, constitute a subcultural jargon.

Listen to these phrases through the ears of a secular person, totally unacquainted with Christianity: "Accept Jesus into your heart;" "pray the sinner's prayer;" "come under conviction;" have a quiet time;" "washed in the blood;" and even "Praise the Lord!" While it is possible for well-meaning believers to use language like this as a sincere expression of their thoughts,

it is usually evidence that they have lost touch with unbelievers.

Piousbabble thrives by inflating normal language. Every talk becomes a "message" and every enjoyable experience becomes a "blessing." Inspired sermons are "anointed" and strong impulses occur because of "a leading of the Lord." There is usually no sinister motive behind this kind of word substitution—it is merely the accepted lingo of the tribe. However, there is a darker

side to some word choices. The temptation to "baptize" one's own ideas and plans with divine approval powerfully appeals to us insecure and immature humans. Unless you are an Old Testament prophet or a New Testament apostle, the words "the Lord has told me" don't belong in your mouth. Yet how often believers fall back on these piousbabble phrases to bolster their own self-esteem. If God gave me my idea, you can hardly have the temerity to disagree with it!

Dick Lucas, the eminent Anglican pastor, is a firm opponent of what he calls "pious froth." He tells the story of a man who began every discussion with the words "I've really prayed about it and the Lord has shown me..." He finally replied, "Well, I've prayed about it, too, and the Lord has shown me the exact opposite." A short, but mind-cracking silence ensued. "Now I guess we'll just have to discuss the issue like rational human beings," Lucas concluded, and they did.

Because we are trying to obey Paul's admonition in I Cor. 14:23-25 to speak in language that will be intelligible to the unbelievers who are sure to be present, we work hard to comb piousbabble out of Redeemer's corporate vocabulary. It still occurs occasionally, either through a slip of the tongue of some otherwise concerned believer, or from the mouth of a newcomer who was discipled in another tradition.

What a pity, however, it is to see new Christians, who have come to faith at Redeemer from secular backgrounds, begin to pick up piousbabble under the impression that it distinguishes them as maturing believers. Rather, they should look at our Heavenly Father, who, when he desired to communicate, did not do so in some heavenly jargon, but with the Word Incarnate, Jesus.
