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Crown Financial Counseling Course to be Taught at Redeemer

uring the last 17 years our country has experienced unprecedented economic growth. The Dow Jones has grown from 776 to over 9,000. Unemployment is at a record low and personal incomes are at an all time high. Yet 1998 saw a disturbing new record—1.4 million Americans filed for bankruptcy. During the height of the Great Depression only 700,000 Americans filled for bankruptcy protection.

The problem is deeper than just people who cannot stay out of debt. Millions report in surveys that they are unsatisfied with their work and constantly worry about money. The answer is also deeper than just making

more money, spending less or a career change. The root problem is our attitude toward and relationship with money itself.

Crown Ministries is a financial course which has been taught in churches around the world which will enable you to learn God's perspective on money. It is a 12 week course taught in small groups which will examine what the Bible says about finances.

There are over 2,350 verses in the Bible which deal with money, saving, tithing, giving and stewardship, making money and how we deal with it one of the chief topics. Richard Halverson, former chaplain to the United States Senate, said: "Jesus Christ said [so much] about money because money is of first importance when it comes to a diagnosing a person's true nature. Money is an exact index of our true character. Throughout Scripture we find an intimate correlation between the development of a person's character and how he or she handles money."

On Saturday, March 13, 1999, there will be a 6 hour Leader Training Seminar to train leaders for the Crown Ministries Small Group Financial Study. ELISABETH ELLIOT TO SPEAK APRIL 24

n 1956 five young men serving as missionaries in Ecuador were massacred by the Auca Indians, a stone age cannibalistic tribe. As the American people and the Christian community mourned the loss from afar, the young widow of Jim Elliot faced the realization that her husband, for whom she had waited eight years to marry, was gone, leaving her with a young daughter and a long uncharted journey ahead. Through that experience, and also losing her second husband, Addison Leitch to cancer, Elisabeth Elliot has learned that a quiet heart is the result of something beyond circumstances.

In the subsequent forty-three years, Elisabeth has continued to learn and to share her insights with millions of people through books, seminars and daily radio broadcasts. The Women In the Church (WIC) at Redeemer have invited Elisabeth Elliot to speak concerning what God has taught her about "Keeping a Quiet Heart" on Saturday, April 24th, at Calvary Baptist Church. Preparing for the Easter Sacrificial Offering

Leading up to the Easter Sacrificial Offering on April 4, Redeemer will feature testimonies of individuals whose lives have been changed by the gospel through the work of Hope for New York.

ne of the disciplines of Lent is to meditate on the sufferings of Jesus, both in his life and in his death. We remember what Dietrich Bonhoeffer in *The Cost of Discipleship* called the "costly grace" of God. He says that "grace is costly because it calls us to follow, and it is grace because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ...it is costly because it cost God the life of his Son...it is grace because God did not reckon his Son too dear a price to pay for our life."

In recalling the poverty that Christ brought on himself for our sakes, for centuries the church has remembered the poor with a sacrificial offering as part of the celebration of Christ's resurrection. At Redeemer, that offering goes to Hope for New York, which uses it on behalf of the hurting in the city - children, seniors, the homeless, the addicted and many more.

During Easter we have the opportunity to remember the price that Christ paid to purchase our eternal life. To the degree we understand the price paid and the depths to which Christ went for us, we will understand the magnitude of his love and the height of joy we have in him. From the Incarnation to the Resurrection, Christ invites us to follow in his poverty and to share in his joy.

GLORYING IN OUR WEAKNESS

hen we read what Paul wrote in I Corinthians 11:30— "If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness."—it should set off little alarm bells in our modern consciousness. Paul was in the midst of a vigorous defense of his authority as an apostle, which was under serious attack from what he calls "super-apostles" (v.5) Shouldn't he be assembling a killer resume, highlighting his successes, his strengths, his victories, rather than his weaknesses?

The prevailing assumption in the Christian world today is that if I profess the name of Christ, it is my duty to present a spotless, unblemished, flawless life for the inspection of the world as a way of honoring Christ. To be sure, scandalous behavior secretly indulged in by hypocrites or a defiant embrace of things which God has called sin <u>are</u> a cause for grief within the Christian community and contempt outside of it.

However, I'm talking about the normal day-to-day experi-

ence of the average believer who tries and fails, sins and repents, screws up and tries again. Our instinct, formed by the world, is to cover up, as best we can, our failures and present a smiling front to the world. ("See how great it is to be a Christian! Don't you want to be one, too!") This view of Christian behavior substitutes a sentimental, superficial peace for the delirious and outrageous joy of the Gospel.

Paul knew better than we. In chapter 12, verses 9 and 10, he goes on to say "[The Lord] said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me." The actual fact is that we rob Jesus of his best opportunity to display his grace and his power when we conceal our failures and our flaws.

Once we are willing to drop the pretense that we are pulledtogether, polished, and perfect, grace becomes a spring of joy welling up in our lives. What a By Kathi Keller

relief not to have to pretend to have the perfect marriage, the perfect children, the perfect devotional life! What a relief, not to have to rely on my own performance for my acceptance! Though I continue to aspire to wholeness (and holiness) in those areas, I can finally admit my failures honestly, knowing that God loved me and adopted me as his child even before I myself was aware of my flaws. Furthermore, his power as a savior is more clearly seen in the life of someone who needs to be saved, than in the buttoned-down, airbrushed life of the Christian poseur.

Abandoning the pretense of perfection also has the effect of making Christianity attractive to the non-believer. Self-righteousness not only creates a barrier between us and God, it also divides us from our needy neighbors. Only the true humility of facing my daily need for grace makes me an acceptable messenger of grace to the non-believer. So Jesus is more fully glorified by our weakness than by our strengths.
