If we find ourselves misunderstood or think we are being treated even with a lack of courtesy, consider it a privilege.

2012 EI FORUM: RE-IMAGINE POWER

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

What is gospel entrepreneurship? The Ei Forum brings this idea to life by gathering together a diverse group of entrepreneurs, investors, and pastors one weekend a year. Since its launch in 2006, the Ei Forum has grown in size and influence, fueled by an ever-increasing passion for entrepreneurship in New York City and beyond.

This year, the Forum will take place at the new W83 Ministry Center starting on the evening of April 13 through the afternoon of April 14. This event invites entrepreneurs in arts, for profit, and not-for-profit, investors of time, talent, and resources, and pastors to unite around a common vision of using entrepreneurial ventures to transform cities and further human flourishing.

This initiative has launched a number of ventures and partnerships inside and outside of New York, including **Restore NYC**—an organization which brings healing to women previously victimized by sex trafficking, **Tegu**—a company which designs, builds, and sells creative toy blocks to provide jobs in a developing nation, and **Working Proof Gallery**—a company that promotes art and social responsibility through the curation of affordable artistic prints.



Churches in both Louisville and Chattanooga are now supporting entrepreneurs and the latter has started a notfor-profit initiative called Launch Chattanooga. Both of these partnerships developed through relationships forged at past Ei Forums. Several foundations have embraced gospel entrepreneurship and are important investors of this initiative. These stories provide a glimpse into the fruits of a community working out their kingdom calling together.

God's Spirit continues to lead the way every year as this gospel-centered entrepreneurship movement grows. Forum participants in 2012 will Re-imagine Power based on Acts 1:8. Power is a word that carries great weight and responsibility. We constantly see it wielded for both good and evil across all sector lines and national boundaries. As Christ's followers we will come together to deepen our understanding of the source of true power and how we can, in our distinctive roles, access and steward this power for God's glory. It is our hope that the Forum will impart not only Biblical wisdom to its participants but also exhort them to faithfully use their God-given power to build, support, or invest in culture-renewing ventures.

Helping us to think about Re-imagine Power will be speakers, including David Gibbons, founder of New Song Church Network and Xealot; Dr. Tim Keller: Sebastian Traeger, founder of Razoo; Rev. Tim Lucas, founder of Liquid Church and *Christianity.com*; Calvin Wong, founder of ICE Lounge and Community Connect; and other key leaders from the Ei community. For (Continued on page 8)

and high school students) traveled to Uganda for a second visit to our partnering schools there: the TAOST school in Jinja, and the Rock Primary School in Lawanda. While there we led a Vacation Bible School program, made craft projects (batik and jewelry making) with primary school children. Some taught a sewing class for the adult ladies, while others cleared and planted a demonstration plot, and painted the Rock Primary church/school. Perhaps more importantly Redeemer's Youth Community through our work and relationships became even more invested in the future of our Ugandan friends and look forward to returning in the summer of 2013.

Opportunities abound

There are many opportunities throughout the year to support the efforts of Redeemer's Youth. Whether by supporting a student in NYC through the Youth Scholarship Fund, contributing to this summer's domestic mission trip to Lincoln Village, AL or continuing to help our friends in Uganda create a sustainable school program, the students in our church are seeking to live out the Gospel with their friends, city and the world. For the last

three years our community has raised funds to purchase classroom items, musical instruments for a choir and music program, and children's books to help fill library bookshelves at the TAOST school. Now, with sole focus on Care and Share/Rock Primary we are encouraged that this community school is now in session *(Continued on page 6)*

Hope for New York & Don't Walk By: Empowering Volunteers

T ast month hundreds of L Don't Walk By volunteers divided into teams and canvassed the city on a search for the homeless, offering the people they encountered care kits and an invitation to return to a nearby church for food and medical assistance. Don't Walk By is an annual collaboration of faith-based organizations that are committed to serving the homeless, and a number of Hope for New York's affiliates (The Bowery Mission, NYC Relief, NYC Rescue Mission) were involved in the outreach. Hope for New York has supported this movement by recruiting volunteers and providing financial support for the past four years.

At each of the four outreaches—Harlem, West Side, Downtown, and East Side— Don't Walk By volunteers engaged the homeless. They sat with their homeless brothers and sisters, learned their names, heard their stories, and prayed with them. They met immediate physical needs and provided connections to resources and rehabilitation programs that provide alternatives to living on the street. One Don't Walk By volunteer shared this story from the outreach in Harlem:

At the end of the night, the last street team came in with a man named Darren. Since we were all wrapping up to go home, we didn't have much time to chat so I cut to the chase—I asked him if he wanted to go somewhere for the night. He quickly told me that he just needed a second chance. Darren told me that earlier that night in his despair, he cried out to God in the subway station and right after that, this team of Don't Walk By street

volunteers approached him, offering to take him back to the anchor church! I was just floored and we prayed in that moment for God to continue the work that was started in him that night. Darren is at The Bowery Mission right now, getting the care and attention he needs to get a fresh start in life.

We're praying for Darren and the countless other men and women living on the street who were affected by the Don't Walk By events. We're also thanking God for the hundreds of Hope for New York volunteers who helped make this massive outreach a reality, who on four Saturday nights in February decided not to walk by and instead to engage and love and minister to the poorest of the poor in our city.

God's faithfulness and love for his creation found its highest commitment through Christ's death, which then brought the promise of peace for our chaotic world. What does this mean for artists? How should this good news affect our art? Our work? Our callings? Christ's resurrection signals the ultimate transformation of all things. This movement of grace rouses artists into redemptive action-to create beauty and give purpose to that which is broken. This high call extends not only to the arts, but to all spheres of culture. How can each of us in our respective roles seek to participate in the work Christ began in making all things new?

Please join us to re-awaken this call to the priesthood of all believers so that we might distinctively engage in cultural renewal in light of the resurrection on Saturday, March 10 at 7:00PM at the W83 Ministry Center, 150 W. 83rd St.

members and attenders live in the UWS zipcodes of 10023, 10024, and 10025. In 1999 we began worship services on the UWS, and a strong community of faithful congregants have been serving one another and their neighbors for years through Fellowship Groups, Moms Groups, and Hope for New York affiliates, to name a few. So the Redeemer community has been active on the West Side for quite some time.

But with the opening of the W83rd Ministry Center our capacity to serve the neighborhood and one another will be enhanced in new and significant ways. The space will become home to many existing and new ministries. The classroom space and large fellowship hall will allow for more community building and discipleship. The addition of a 4th worship service will open up new space to our friends, co-workers and neighbors who are exploring Christianity. The possibilities are endless. But the mission remains the same.

Redeemer was planted 23 years ago with the core belief that the gospel of Jesus Christ is the renewing power that will one day bring the beauty, hope, grace and justice of God's kingdom on earth as it is in heaven. Through worship, social justice, cultural engagement and deepening community we have sought to make Jesus visible to the City we love. As someone who has been a part of the Redeemer story from the beginning I am incredibly grateful and humbled to be able to play a part in this next chapter.
