PROGRESS AND CHALLENGE AT REDEEMER

The last two years have been as exciting and momentous a chapter of Redeemer's ministry history as we have ever seen. In 2009 we announced our plan to transition Redeemer from a single centralized multi-site church to a "collegiate" network of three congregations that would eventually generate other sites and other worshipping communities, as well.

In 2012 we opened the W83 Ministry Center on the West Side and launched our Downtown congregation. As 2013 closes we are now completing our first full year operating as three collegiate congregations. I want to thank the members and friends of Redeemer who have poured so much energy into becoming such strong congregations. One immediate result has been a significant growth in attendance. In the last two years our fall attendance has grown from approximately 4800 to 5600 on a Sunday, a very healthy increase.

There are reports across the congregations of greater involvement in volunteer work and ministry and of deeper engagement in community. People are "owning" their congregations and their ministry in "their" part of the city. This fall's *Public Faith* initiative has challenged and stretched our people toward more loving and courageous engagement to friends and colleagues. Perhaps most significantly of all, many new leaders—more lay ministers, staff, and pastors—have grown as a result of the collegiate model. It is this that gives us assurance that Redeemer's ministry can change lives in the city for a long time to come.

There is overwhelming consensus that congregationalizing Redeemer in this way has been the right decision. We can already see how crucial it has been for renewing and more deeply establishing Redeemer's distinct way of serving. We are seeing Redeemer's gospel ministry vision released across the city. This is most definitely the way forward for us.

However, we must emphasize that the continued fruitfulness of this congregational model comes (Continued on page 2)

with an increased financial cost. It is much more expensive to maintain three different locations than it would be to put everyone in one large space. Like all major projects, the Redeemer collegiate model is being funded with start-up capital—the RENEW Campaign and the Downtown Challenge—that are being spent down.We must continue to grow our *annual* giving significantly over the next three years in order to support the entire operating budget without the seed funds.

To date giving in 2013 has been consistently stronger than last year and we expect to finish the year exceeding our goal of \$13.9M But it is important to see that we will have to grow our giving to the operation budget at a similarly significant pace for at least two more years to bring ourselves to the place where the annual giving covers our yearly *(Continued on page 6)*

CFW's Gotham Alumnus Tina Chang and current Gotham Fellow Esther Mun of Little Fury have created a hybrid store/gallery that re-envisions the retail experience with a goal of honoring the Designer. Many in the Center for Faith & Work community have contributed to this endeavor and the pop-up shop is open through December.

Divine Details is an exhibit and store for extraordinarily well-designed everyday goods. A collaboration between AIGA (the world's largest professional design association) and the downtown boutique design studio Little Fury, this hybrid store/ gallery provides a thoughtful and savvy reprieve from the holiday shopping frenzy.

From November 1 to December 28, housed in AIGA's gallery in the heart of the Flatiron district on 5th Ave., Divine Details will feature some of the world's most beautiful and wellcrafted common goods. From the perfect bottle-opener, to a shatterless crystal wine glass, to the most fashionable and functional tote for your CitiBike, this is a space for creator and consumer to connect in a whole new way.

Curated alongside each designer product is an accompanying fictional story, commissioned from some of New York's most exciting writers, including acclaimed music writer Garnette Cadogan (Rolling Stone, Vibe), Brooklyn food blogger Cathy Erway (The Art of Eating In, Eater's Top 10), and playwright Bekah Brunstetter (OOHRAH!, MTV's Underemployed). In addition to daily store hours, the exhibition will also host a series of events entitled "Further Details" focusing on the collaborative relationships between design, food, music, and story.

"Divine Details is a place we built on one very simple idea: things matter. An object's design helps us flourish or falter," says creative director Tina Chang. "The exhibition/store reflects this in a unique way, but is also very accessible. We've created this space with AIGA to transform the holiday shopping rush into an experience that is thoughtful and imaginative, that engages culture as opposed to being consumers of it. It is an exhibition committed to the little 'Ah-ha!' moments we all have when a well-designed object comes to life."

Upon the exhibition's closing, Divine Details will roll into Divine Monthly, a subscription program where participants receive three Divine objects over three months, "perfect for gifting, keeping, or ogling" accompanied by an original commissioned story inspired by the product. Many of you gave to City to City through the Special Offering in September. City to City thanks you and so do the 13 international church planters whose training you helped underwrite. One of these church-planting couples, Confidence and One Mokgatle, send their greetings from Pretoria, South Africa:

It's been a little over two weeks since I arrived back in the City of Pretoria and to say the last 2 months have been eventful would be an understatement!

We spent all of September and October in the United States attending the Redeemer City to City International Church Planting Intensive. We trained alongside people from India, Chile, France, Switzerland, Canada, Amsterdam, United States and another couple from South Africa.

The Intensive both challenged and inspired us. We learned a lot about what it means to plant a church in a city and how to think it all through as we seek to share the gospel with those who don't know Jesus. We also left with a greater understanding of ourselves, our gifts and talents, our strengths and weaknesses and how we can ensure that our marriage continues to reflect the nature and character of God, as we begin on this adventure of planting a church in Pretoria. Not only were we loved and served well, but we felt a great sense of partnership and commitment to seeing the success of this future church plant.

In South Africa we say it takes a village to raise a child. We believe the same commitment is required when planting a church. Its going to take the prayers of multiple communities and individuals to see this church plant become healthy; not only for its existing community, but to witness it go on and plant other healthy churches. For that reason we thank you for being a prayer partner and lifting us up to God as we seek His wisdom, strength and provision.

What lies ahead for us, at least until the end of the year, is to process everything we have learned and begin to answer the question: What does 2014 look like for us? Many questions are still unanswered, but what we do know is that in the new year we are starting a new home group that will meet weekly. This group will be made up of individuals who are interested in being part of the launch team for the church plant in 2015. We will begin to dream together (Continued on page 8)

Artist Bio:

Born in the UK, Rebecca Locke is based in New York City which has proved formative in the development of her installation art, film, photographic, sound and performancebased artwork. She is a graduate of Goldsmiths, University of London, and has studied at the International Center of Photography and the School of Visual Arts in New York City. She is a visiting fellow at The Center for Urban and Community Research, Goldsmiths, University of London, an inaugural member of the Association of Urban Photographers and curator of the City to Sea Project. City to Sea developed from Rebecca's practice, specifically her work based on her hometown Bognor Regis.

Rebecca exhibits internationally and recent exhibitions include the Lab Film Festival, London; Visual Urbanism: Perspectives on Contemporary Research, The British Library, London; Festival de la Imagen, Columbia and the first Bienal de Fotografía, Lima, Peru, which featured the artist's video and sound series Lugares qui fui (everywhere I've ever been). The artist's City to Sea Project recently collaborated with Magnum Photos for a workshop and screening at the Urban Encounters festival at Tate Britain. The artist is currently working on a film, E pluribus unum, and a self-portrait based series exploring narrative identity.

expenses. These are our goals for the next three years. They are challenging ones, to be sure.

This year most of you will receive more charitable year end giving appeals than ever before. Every year I see more good causes and charitable organizations reaching out to me with their requests for financial support. I have two words of advice.

First, the great majority of those reading these words could probably give a great deal more. We typically give out of what we feel we can spare. And that usually means what we can spare without any emotional cost or inconvenience to our lifestyle choices. But when we only give what we can spare, we are not tapping into the greater resources we could give if we are motivated by the joy of the gospel. The Lord Jesus Christ... though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich." (2 Corinthians 8:7,9.)

Jesus did not give out of what he could spare. Jesus did not give (Continued on page 7) When I first saw the information for the Committed to Freedom—Beyond Abuse Seminar in the Redeemer Bulletin, I thought it was a nice resource, but not necessary for me. Sure, I'd been sexually abused as a child, but I was fine and had everything under control. But it was good that others had the option, though.

As the years went by, I got married, bought a townhouse in the Jersey burbs and moved on with my life but it turned out things weren't as "fine" as I'd thought. My life had progressed in every measure, but it was getting increasingly more difficult to mask the pain. Even worse, I found that ignoring the issue wasn't just eating me from the inside-out; it was damaging my marriage as well. I reluctantly pursued professional help via counseling.

I couldn't have found a more qualified therapist. While she counseled me in the evenings, her "day job" was with DYFS (NJ State's Child Services agency) and she too had been sexually abused as a child. However, she was not a professed believer in Christ so while it was extremely effective using her as a sounding board to tease out issues, I felt there was still something missing. What about God? How did my God fit into all of this?

When I saw that Redeemer was offering the Beyond Abuse Seminar again, I was ready. It was still terrifying, but there was a missing piece in my recovery and searching for it helped propel me passed the fear. Attending that seminar was one of the best decisions I made and was a significant step in the right direction of my abuse recovery. It enabled me to build a place for God in the midst of all that

happened to me as a kid (this might sound blasphemous, but understand that sometimes we ignore the ones we love when we're angry and confused with them). While I still left the Seminar with many unanswered questions to struggle through, there was significantly greater understanding, insight and hope. We are not alone in our struggle for health, balance and healing. There are others, and there is most certainly our God.

Jesus' birth reminds us that we need a Savior. As we celebrate our Savior's birth, we are encouraged to renew our commitment to live a new life that was given to us through our Savior. Does your new life *involve greater healing and greater* freedom from past traumas? out of his riches—he gave <u>away</u> his riches. Gospel-shaped giving doesn't even *begin* until it entails sacrifice and scarcity. That makes you nervous and presses you to look at Jesus' cosmic philanthropy for you. But then that comforts us for we see our inheritance in heaven that can never fade or be lost. All other inheritances (and retirement funds) pale before that. The second practical word of advice is this. If you attend a church regularly for spiritual sustenance you should financially support it at some level, and that support should not be nominal. There are many good and important ministries and charities out there, and our family supports many of them. But there is no more foundational and important giv-

ing for a Christian than giving to the church which ministers to you. Large churches, especially those in urban areas, often have a significant number of people who come and are served but who don't (at least initially) financially support it. Your gifts make it possible to bring the gospel to these people. If you come—please bless us with your gifts. Thanks!
