Public Faith for 25 Years

n a Sunday evening in April 1989, I walked into the Seventh Day Adventist Church for a worship service at a new church plant called Redeemer. I had graduated from Columbia a year earlier and was in my first year of a new job and living on the Upper East Side. I was bouncing around different churches at the time when a friend from graduate school told me about this new church that was starting up so I thought I would give it a try. The rest, as they say, is history.

As we celebrate 25 years of what God has done in and through Redeemer Presbyterian Church, I find it impossible to separate Redeemer's story from my own. I have been asked many times what it was like in the early days and why I am still so connected to the community. My answers to those questions are less nostalgic than they are strategic, as I see lots of parallels between those early days and our current model.

For example, in this year of Public Faith, I am reminded of one of the reasons I found Redeemer so compelling in the early days. To put it simply — it was a safe place to doubt! Growing up in the church and the culture of Christianity, like I did, often leads very little room to question your beliefs. But knowing and following Jesus is a journey that often reflects a father's answer to Jesus, "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" (Mark 9:24). To be a Christian is to live on a continuum of assurance and doubt, and therefore I am grateful that one of the values of our community is to embrace the doubter in each of us.

How does this inform our current situation? While there are challenges living in an increasingly 'post-Christian' world, I see great opportunities as we begin the next chapter of our history. Charles Taylor, in his book "A Secular Age," notes how both Christians and secularists are 'haunted' by the faith of the other. Secularists, absent a vocabulary that explains so much of the world around them, are haunted by *(Continued on page 5)*

ANNOUNCING THIS YEAR'S EI FORUM: DISRUPTION

The concept of disruption is a fascinating one and has been particularly significant for entrepreneurship and for understanding the dynamics of innovation. Economists like Joseph Schumpeter (1883-

1950), a contemporary of John Maynard Keynes, championed the notion that disruptive innovation leads to "creative destruction," a wellknown phrase that he coined. For Schumpeter and his present-day followers such as Clayton Christensen (Harvard Business School), understanding the role of disruption is critical to

a flourishing commercial enterprise as well as a flourishing economy. Whether it's disruption created by human-made innovation or by an unforeseen "act of God," these massive changes and shifts create a significant opportunity — one that we can respond to with either fear or courage.

Disruption instigates a powerful occasion to not only understand the deeper drives that govern our motives, but to solidify our commitments that lead to resolute actions and innovation. This year's Entrepreneurship & Innovation Forum will explore these dynamics to help participants discern how the gospel transforms the way we experience disruption. God uses disruption in our lives to confront us with His reality, especially during times when our own agenda and ourselves consume us. When we are confronted with the vision of God's glory in the light of the gospel, fearful avoidance turns into courageous action. Em-



powered by God's love, we are able to see otherwise potentially unnerving changes in our world as opportunities to bring about Spirit-led innovation. As the gospel becomes clearer, disruption can distinctively refine and hone our sense of calling, commitment, and purpose in our work.

We are particularly excited to convene this year's EI Forum. The Forum is open to people of all professions and industries, and is not intended to be limited solely to entrepreneurs. However, in order to create a more intimate and focused environment for this year's participants, registration will be capped at 200 attendees. We hope this will provide the potential for greater opportunities to process the ma-

Faith & Work Transformation: 3-Month Vocational Intensives

When I considered signing up for the CFW Vocational Intensive, I was hesitant to commit. With wedding planning on my mind, I certainly wasn't looking to get involved in a 3-month program to take any more of my time.

Some referred to it as "Mini Gotham," which was one of the main reasons I was interested. Because I had been both skeptical and afraid to apply for Gotham, I wanted to experience a glimpse of it first through this Vocational Intensive. I wasn't aware

how much influence and impact it would have on my work life and spiritual growth.

Before this program, I never stopped to ask myself how I could integrate my faith into the workplace. In hindsight, my church, work, and social life were not intertwined, but instead, were kept separate from one another. For some time, I was selfishly preoccupied with finding the perfect job. I desired to find something that I loved to do, that made me feel better about myself, and that would gain me recognition. Essentially, I was looking for work itself to fulfill me. I wanted work to serve me rather than me serving my work. Never did I ask myself how I could serve and bring God's kingdom into the workplace until I began this 3-month Vocational Intensive.



Through exposure to readings, theologians, and daily devotionals, I began to see things differently in the city and workplace. As the brokenness in my work became more apparent, I gradually developed a longing to engage and mend it. I started to realize the sinful, mundane reactions to work were rooted in something deeper within my heart. Rather than a simple behavioral change, I needed a true heart change. I have now come to understand that in whatever circumstance or job I am given, it is my role and desire to bring God's glory into it by doing good work, developing deeper relationships, and seeking renewal.

The community aspect of this program was truly amazing. I was part of the Cross-Vocational group, comprised

> of people working in many different industries. Although we differed in job experiences, we shared similar struggles in integrating our faith into the workplace. Through our discussions, prayers, and encouragement for one another, I devel-

oped a better understanding of true Christian fellowship. As Bonhoeffer wrote, "Christian Community is not an ideal we have to realize, but rather a reality created by God in Christ in which we may participate."

Although my transformation is ongoing, I have been equipped with the lens of the gospel, which I strive to use daily as I look into the brokenness of the city, and specifically, my field of work. My time in the program has truly been a blessing and an instrumental part of my spiritual growth.

the transcendence of a God who created them and gives purpose and meaning to their lives. Christians on the other hand are haunted by what Flannery O'Connor called the 'conflict between an attraction for the Holy and the disbelief in it that we breathe in with the air of our times.' Why is this an opportunity? From the earliest days Redeemer has intentionally acknowledged and wrestled with the conflict O'Connor describes. It has therefore developed a vocabulary and culture of faith that helps both those who grew up in the church, as well as those who have long since written God off as irrelevant. As we look ahead to the next 25 years of being public with our faith, my hope is that we will continue to be a community that is honest about our own doubts, and patiently introduces our friends to the gospel of Jesus Christ.
